


DEMOGRAPHICS

PRIORITY AREAS OF NEED

 Tackling inequalities and changing attitudes for people with Special Educational Needs and disability

Thanet district has the highest proportion of disability benefit claimants in the county with 11.4% (16,222 people) of the resident population claiming DLA (Disability Living Allowance), Personal Independence Payment (PIP) or Attendance Allowance (AA). 144 Thanet also has the highest proportion of the resident population stating that a health condition or disability limited their day-to-day activities to some degree. 145 Disability is one of the strongest predictors of living in poverty. Nearly half of all those living below the breadline live in a household where someone is disabled. In addition to adult disability, Thanet also has the highest prevalence of SEN generally amongst children and in particular, the highest level of autism. 146

2. Mitigating the long-term impact of child poverty and disadvantage to improve life chances

Thanet has the highest number and proportion of children living in absolute low-income families in Kent. 147



Thanet residents have the lowest

Almost half of the wards in Thanet (48%) are within the 20% of wards in Kent with the highest proportion of children living in poverty (18% or more children in absolute low-income families). More than a quarter of under 4's in Thanet live in absolute low-income families, and almost a fifth of under 16's. 149

Nearly a quarter of children in Thanet are in low income families 151




A fifth of children in Thanet live in absolute low-income families 152

From evidence we know that many families living in absolute low-income and/or accessing benefits like Universal Credit may be tipped into food poverty and debt.

DEPRIVATION

Thanet is the most deprived district in Kent and Medway. A rank of 1 on the table below, is the most deprived. There are 333 local authorities in England.



Thanet Food Link operate by using a voucher system, taking referrals from agencies who work directly with people in need including Children's Centres, support agencies, schools, associations supporting disabled people, Community Centres and NHS Health Trainers.

The voucher a client receives provides them and those in their household with a minimum of three days emergency food.

"This has been an unprecedented year for Thanet Food Link as we supported people impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic. We remained open for business throughout the pandemic and were pleased to have been able to increase the production of food parcels as demand increased, with fantastic support from our local community – individuals, organisations and businesses. Food parcel distribution increased from 130 per month to 1,000 per month at the height in June 2020 and remains at around 500 per month.

"Numerous people came to the Food Link in desperation thinking it was something they would never have to do but lengthy furlough or sudden unemployment especially with children being off school and access to benefit agencies limited - we were lifesavers. We will continue to do all we can to support those who would otherwise be hungry."

3. Protection of vulnerable children and young people

The high numbers of vulnerable children in Thanet are inevitably linked to its high levels of child poverty. The district is ranked worst for a number of indicators including numbers of missing children, number of children in care and children subject to a child protection plan.

4. Alleviating circumstances that lead to poor mental health and loneliness to build resilience and aid recovery

The high deprivation levels in Thanet provide a backdrop to a picture of poor mental health. Thanet ranks worst for average happiness ratings and average life satisfaction levels and has the highest levels of mental health in the county. Thanet has the highest number of single person households in Kent and ranks loneliest in the county and 68th out of 333 Local Authorities for persons over 65.

5. Education, employment and enterprise

Residents in Thanet have the lowest median weekly full-time earnings at £507.70. People living in Thanet also have the lowest weekly earnings of the Kent districts, within the bottom 20% in England. Thanet has the lowest resident earnings in Kent and second lowest in the whole of the Southeast.
